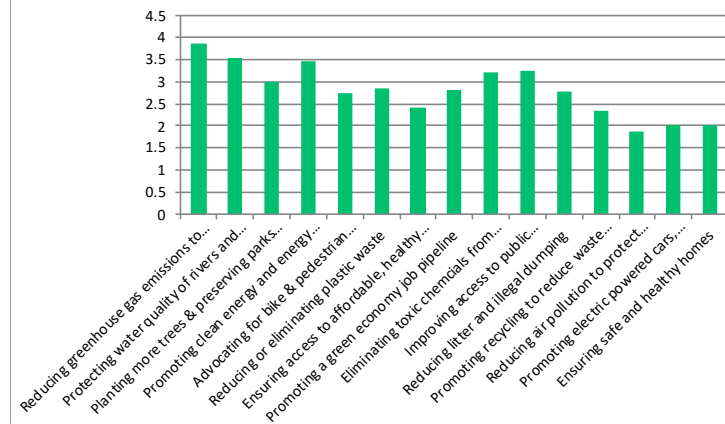

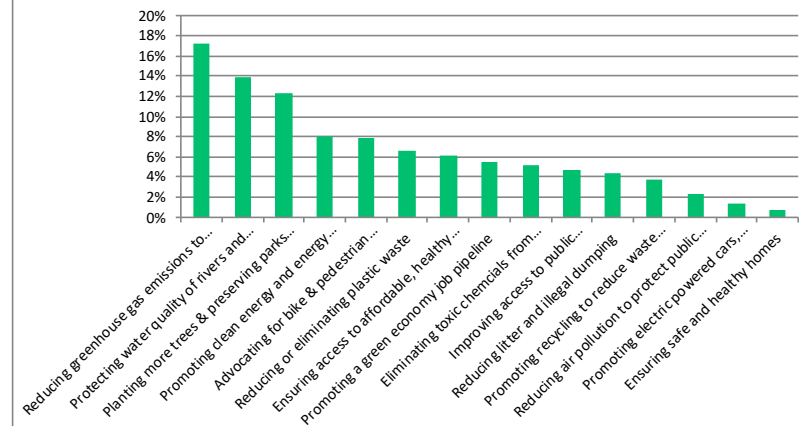

One large cause of plastic waste is take-out containers that are plastic where we just carry them home and throw them away. We need restaurants and grocery stores to use biodegradable takeout containers and get rid of plastic.

Lots of those issues are important

In Hartford we have a JobCorps site which is directly managed at the Federal level but there's no connection to green job opportunities.

More trees; less litter; more bikes

Awfully hard to pick

These are all essential, and most effectively managed if approached from a strategic standpoint versus working on issues based on how important they are to stakeholders. For example, money saved from energy efficiency projects could fund a commitment to sustainable procurement of less toxic and locally produced goods and services, can help to transition to a sustainable economy. Additionally, putting an internal price on carbon (see Yale Carbon Project as example), can generate funds to invest in clean energy projects that further reduce emissions, etc.

Most of the issues are as important as the others. I would have rather ranked them, rather than just pick three.

These are all SO critical for the human race right now that it's difficult to pick only three. I placed "reduce litter and illegal dumping" as first only because I feel that the trickle-down benefit will help to promote one or two of the other choices.

Some border on being redundant.

Hard to make a choice -they are all Important and it shows the interconnectedness of the solutions of saving Mother Earth
I would have voted for preserving parks and green spaces, but planting more trees was lumped in with that. We do not need more trees in most areas in Hartford.

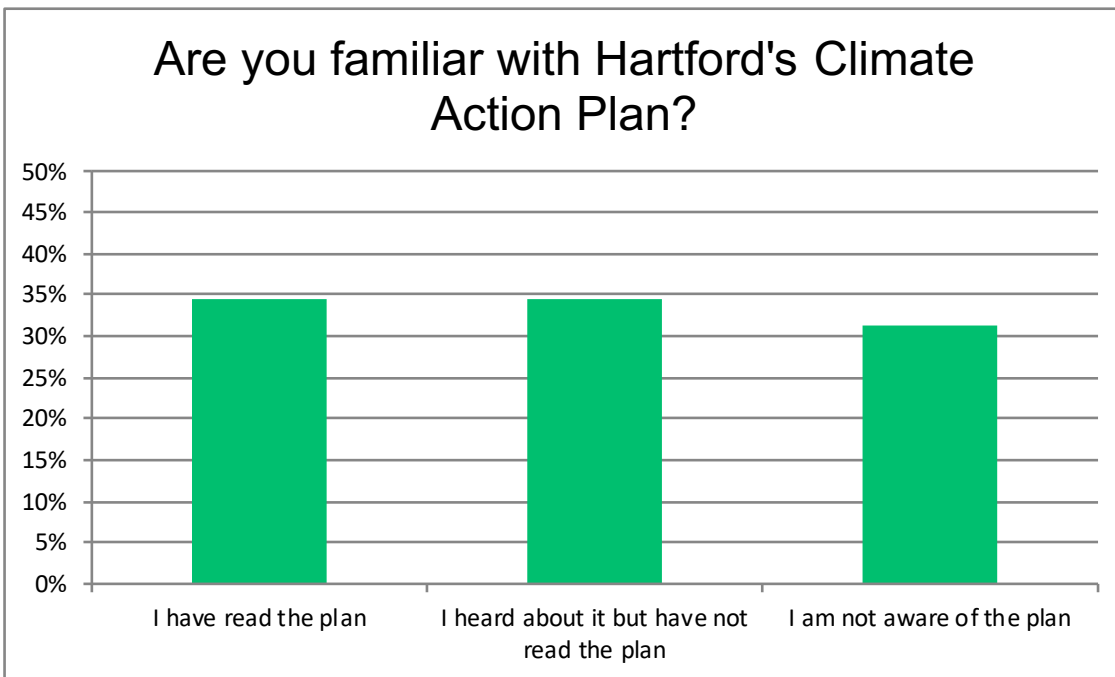
At this particular time, want to focus my time and efforts on what I can do in my church community. But be open to supporting efforts outside my church too.

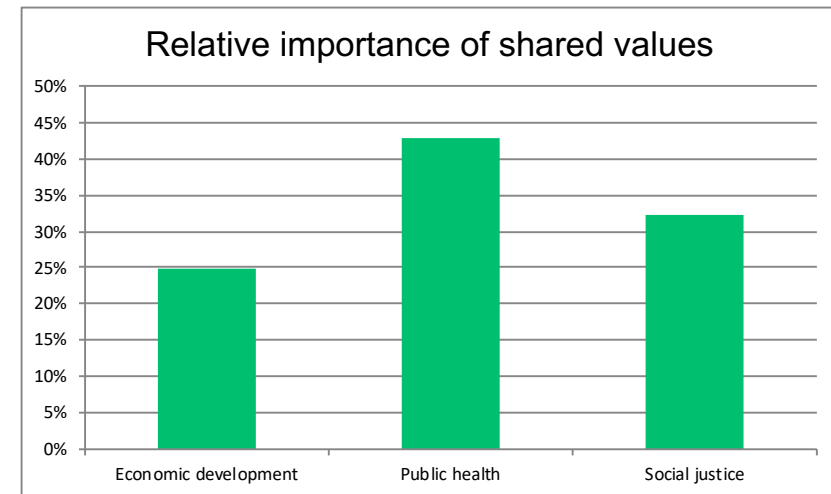
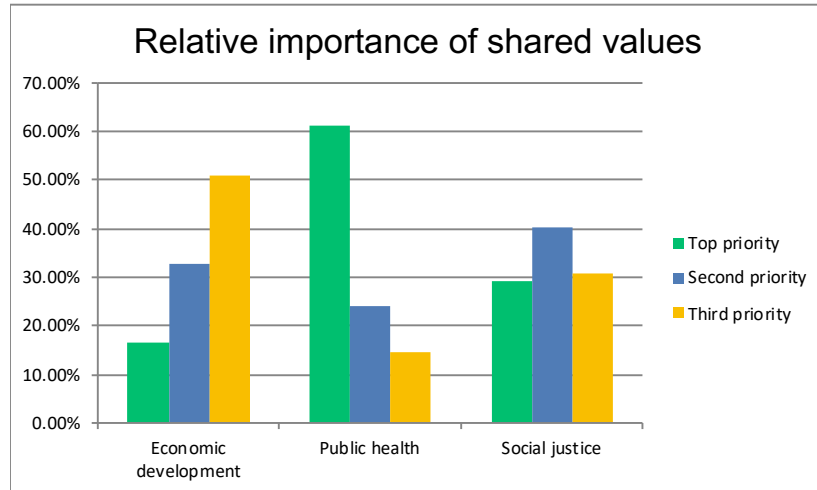
